


Pavlos Carvalho, a local musician, offered to organise a concert in memory of a lady who used to work at Ardingly college, where he went to school.

Nearly £700 was raised for the Motor Neurone Disease Association, a charity that helps those afflicted by this dreadful illness. Carol Rieley, chairman of the local branch, was able to tell the audience that only that morning she had received a request from the Head Office for funds to buy a suction machine for a lady in Horsham who has MND and is unable to swallow her own saliva. As direct result of their attendance that night sufficient money had been raised to cover its purchase.

Carvalho and Friends. In a moving tribute Pavlos, who attended Ardingly College, told how much Doris, who was a member of the cleaning staff, was loved and respected by all at the school.

The concert consisted of chamber music by Haydn, Brahms and Schubert and was particularly well suited to the intimate nature of the recital room. The musicians, all of whom are either students or recent graduates of the Royal College of Music, gave a performance worthy of ensembles of much greater fame and experience. It was a delightful evening enjoyed by both musicians and audience alike and a wonderful tribute to Doris.
